2. Course description

In this course the students will study and analyze how authoritarian leaders such as Josef Stalin and Fidel Castro rose to power and then consolidated/maintained it through a series of domestic and foreign policies which had an impact in their respective countries and established **Authoritarian States**. Moreover, it will be analyzed Japanese, German and Italian militarism and expansionism in the prescribed subject 3: **The move to global war**. Additionally, students will examine how the wartime allies broke this alliance and became enemies due to their political, economic and ideological differences in the world history topic 12: **The Cold War: Superpower tensions and rivalries**. Last but not least, the development of the **Internal Assessment** will be started this year: the selection of the topic, the narrowing of the research question as well as the identification of the evaluation of sources will be carried out at the end of this school year.

3. Objectives

3.1 General Objectives:

- To comprehend History as a discipline, including the nature and diversity of its sources, methods and interpretations by analyzing, recording, reconstructing and interpreting the past through the investigation of a variety of sources either graphic or written.
- To encourage an understanding of the present through critical reflection upon the past, analyzing the historical developments at national, regional and international levels.









- To identify the challenges that mankind has faced in all spheres of life.
- To examine critically the decisions humans made in the past and consider how those choices have affected the present.
- To explain short-term and long-term historical events as long as their regional and global impact.
- To describe the development and the significance of different political, social, and economic policies carried out by right-wing and left-wing leaders that modified the world as it is seen today.
- To discuss the historical/political changes America, Europe, and Asia, had in the 20th century.
- To demonstrate the ability to structure an essay, using different interpretations to support relevant, balanced and focused historical arguments.
- To develop an awareness that human attitudes and opinions are widely diverse and that a study of society requires an appreciation of such diversity.
- To apply the acquired knowledge in the international examinations (International Baccalaureate exams)

3.2 Specific Objectives:

Knowledge and comprehension

- To demonstrate knowledge and comprehension from a variety of textbooks and academic books.
- To identify and comprehend a primary source, a secondary source and tertiary source.
- To demonstrate the comprehension of the different perspectives and how these influence on the analysis of an event.

Application and analysis

- To demonstrate the capability of choosing a correct quote to back up an analysis.
- To demonstrate the capability of using the correct terminology in an essay.









• To demonstrate the capability of arguing and justifying ideas with pertinent examples.

Synthesis and evaluation

- To demonstrate the capability of comparing and contrasting written sources.
- To evaluate the origin, purpose, value and limitation of a source.
- To demonstrate the capability of evaluating different contrasting points of view.
- To produce a critical answer where knowledge and historiography can be evaluated.

Selection and use of linguistic skills and appropriate presentation

- To demonstrate the capability of expressing clear and fluent ideas in an essay.
- To demonstrate the capability of comparing and contrasting two authoritarian leaders.
- To demonstrate the capability of selecting the correct material to answer IB questions such as: to what extent.
- To demonstrate the capability of producing a balanced analysis.
